Embarking on an Educational Expansion

ollowing our intense efforts to create a Center of Excellence in online education, and with success registered in our accreditation efforts for both the programs and the institution, the International Open University has embarked on its expansion drive under the guidance of the Chancellor.

The Gambia as a Pilot for Expansion

In the Gambia, where the Global Headquarters is based, the IOU has entered into agreements with many leading institutions to ensure that students who have completed non-degree professional programs can now obtain their first degrees.

The IOU has also offered a thousand scholarships through its One Million Scholarship for deserving African youth project to His Excellency President Adama Barrow. Fifty scholarships will be awarded to youth across the country every semester.

To effectively implement the project, the IOU has already begun its efforts to establish learning centers at strategic locations in the country. The Chancellor inaugurated the first learning center in Jarra Soma, about 200 kilometers from the IOU Headquarters.

The upcoming prison project is also an initiative in collaboration with National Assembly Members to provide Muslim prison inmates with educational and psychological support.

Scanning the African Horizon

For more than a year now, the IOU has been reaching out to other countries to establish itself and bring

higher education to deserving African people. It is a daunting task, expensive, and full of challenges.

East Africa is considered a region where education has expanded considerably, and policymakers embrace the concept of online education. However, most regulations for online education recommend that institutions establish offline centers as well. The IOU has successfully established itself in Uganda, Tanzania, Kenya, Malawi, Zambia, and Mozambique (the only Lusophone country).

Following several meetings with senior government officials in Liberia, the IOU will now establish its first center there and expand subsequently. Efforts are underway in Guinea Bissau to establish a presence and seek recognition.

The IOU has found it judicious to strengthen its base in many countries, seek recognition in some of the key African countries and international bodies, develop its alumni base, and expand its cooperation with local and international institutions in Africa to ensure that every learner has access to affordable contemporary education.

World of the Writer

I'm writing this article half asleep, pre-breakfast, in a hotel room of Batman (yes, really) in Southern Turkey. I'm here for the launch of my memoir in Turkish, Al ham dulillah. Welcome to the world of writing.

There is a limiting idea that journalism automatically and only refers to politics and news. This beat is getting louder in this age of online shouting. Sadly, this narrative has had the power to put off so many potentially great writers, especially from the Muslim community.

Add to this the image of the right-wing editor, yelling expletives at rookie journalists and the "bar culture," and you have a potent recipe for Muslim families to dismiss journalism as either "indecent" or an "unrealistic career." This view is outdated, and far from the full story. I am here to invite you, and even your parents, to the world of the writer.

Journalism is writing what you know, or what you have researched, to a deadline, for a publication. Simple as that.

When we look at it through this lens, well, the world is our story - and you are automatically an expert in some area. You can begin to write anywhere, any time you like. My work motto for the past quarter of a century has been, "Has laptop, will travel."

And this is my first piece of advice to you.

"A writer is someone who writes." Wait, backspace on that!

"A writer is someone who reads."

Much as I may love to flood the market with stories from all areas of Muslim life and expertise, firstly, please consider journalism, if you love to read. And I mean LOVE it.

Imagine hopping between the writing tones of the Sunday Mirror, the Indie Travel section, the Family supplement in the Times, then Femail, via a column in The Spectator. This is wholly possible, once you know the "sound," the beat, of a good piece of writing.

You see, the real technique, a hidden secret, is having a voice. Your voice. And you can only recognize





what a "voice" means by having writers you love and then writing differently to them - your voice.

In 1998, I was taken to lunch by Christina Odone, then Deputy editor of the important political magazine, "The New Statesman." I had written about 10 pieces by this point for the Evening Standard, mostly on binge drinking and spending money. I wasn't Muslim, so I did not have the hijab question.

My insecurity was still being an "outsider" with little to no experience. I have no degree, I went to drama school, not a university. But, Christina's words, have pushed me forwards ever since. Apply this to yourself: Your passion for the story makes you unique. Your newness to this world makes your words 'fresh.' You let your thoughts flow - and it works!"

None of this happens overnight. But rest assured, if your heart is beating hard reading this, if there is a feeling of excitement in there at the thought of writing a piece on your passion - then that is positive proof you can be a iournalist.

And it is awful, it is gut-wrenchingly cringe, it is float to the ceiling exhilaration. Way too many peaks and troughs for a normal day at work, I know. But maybe, maybe that's you. And certainly, the world then needs your words, your unique outlook.

It doesn't matter if you are on a law degree right now, or studying flower arranging (is that still a thing? Bad example!). Begin reading today. Read far away from academic writing. Read everything you can get your hands on which gets your heart moving. Study the words, love them.

Why are you enjoying or hating reading this piece right now? Is this too irreverent, annoying, enjoyable, amusing - what? Spend your free time analyzing how and why words impact you.

Then-then write. And never stop.

You have a passion and perceive the world in a way nobody else ever has. You have a unique voice. I am writing this to invite you to discover it and then to use it.

Why Muslims Need to Take Up Careers in Journalism



ournalism is a great career; but in the 21st century, we are living in uncertain times where telling the truth or trying to expose lies can cost you your liberty or even your life. Having said that, there is nothing more noble or satisfying than delivering the truth to the breakfast table of readers, listeners or viewers. But, I wonder how many of you are dismayed at the lack of diversity in the world of journalism?

The big news stories today often come from the Muslim world but the messengers are mainly middle-class white men of other faiths or none who, with the best of intentions, struggle to report accurately events unfolding in the Middle East, Asia, and Africa.

Ignorant of Islam, cultures, and practice some journalists make schoolboy errors in their reporting, creating a lack of trust in those receiving the news. So, what is holding Muslims back from launching a successful career as journalists? Also, does diversity really matter? Yes! Of course, it does.

Young Muslims have got to stop blaming their parents who want to push them into becoming doctors, lawyers, or engineers and start seeking the knowledge of Islam and using it to show how our great faith will bless those intending on a career in the media.

Traditional Western-based newsrooms are waking up to the fact that they no longer represent the multicultural society they want to reach. So, in many ways, there isn't a better time than now to enter the media professions which are many and varied.

Islam tells us there is nothing more important than speaking the

truth. Allah instructed us to speak the haqq no matter how complex or precarious the situation.

One of the many important lessons I learned when I first reverted to Islam in 2003 was that God not only rewards Muslims for having the courage to speak the truth but, also opens the gates of Paradise to those who do so.

"This is the Day when the truthful will benefit from their truthfulness. For them are gardens [in Paradise] beneath which rivers flow, wherein they will abide forever, Allah being pleased with them, and they with Him. That is the great attainment." (Al-Maidah: 119)

Not only is delivering the truth incumbent on all journalists but there is a special responsibility for Muslim journalists to write without fear or favor, regardless of the subject.

Our beloved Prophet Muhammad, (ﷺ) said, as narrated by Abu Dhar Ghifari: "Speak the truth even when it is bitter." Some of my most difficult reports have exposed the wrongdoings of Muslims and that is a bitter pill to swallow but, the truth outweighs all other considerations.

As journalists, we must try and remain balanced and impartial in our dealings with most stories; unless I would argue, it is by giving voice to the voiceless and standing up to oppressors. There are also times when the facts speak for themselves and are there for all to see.

Journalism is a powerful weapon, which is why most tyrants and despots like to either control or ban the media. Even in so-called democracies, governments are

well aware of the power and influence that the media can have on voters. Critical front pages and commentaries can win or lose elections, garner the backing of the public, and even start wars.

Delivering the news, educating, and informing, should not be left to others. We as Muslims should step up to the plate and deliver honest reports, especially about what is happening in the Muslim world today.

As I wrote at the beginning of this article, telling the truth is an honorable, noble thing to do. If you do decide to become a journalist, do it for all the right reasons because, despite all the terrible things that happen to journalists, delivering the truth can also bring peace.

magine this scene: members of a small village are gathered at a riverside when they suddenly see a helpless child in the water screaming for help. Someone quickly dives in and pulls the child out. Soon after, another child is seen being pulled by the current, floating helplessly down the river - then another, and another. More children keep appearing in the river, needing rescue. The village is exhausted from keeping watch and taking turns to save as many children as possible. Amid all this, one person finally takes a moment and realizes that this reactive approach is not sustainable. Instead, they ask, "Why are so many children falling into the river in the first place?"

Using a public health perspective, this person gathers a team and travels upstream along the river to determine the root cause of the problem. Researching the issue upstream, they find an old

broken bridge that children have to cross to reach their homes. Some children who were not as strong as others fell into the river when they tried to cross it. Working quickly to prevent any more children from falling in, the team cordons off the area and gathers the necessary experts and materials to fix the bridge, making a safe path for all the children to reach home.

This simplified story of "upstream thinking" illustrates the significance of using a preventative public health perspective to address complex issues affecting our communities health and welfare.

This upstream thinking model is also applicable to Islam's strong emphasis on and prioritization of prevention, seen throughout

our Islamic way of life, from the wisdom of Islamic rulings to the daily recommended acts of worship.

The overall purpose of public health is to improve the collective well-being of a population by preventing harmful conditions and promoting the conditions that allow people to live healthy and productive lives.

The role of public health encompasses a broad range of aspects that affect every part of our daily lives. This includes the nutrients in the food we eat, the chemicals in the air we breathe, or the safety condition of the roads on which we drive and commute.

Additionally, many public health interventions that have helped save lives and improve human health have formed an integral part of the Islamic tradition since its conception. These include, for example, the repeated emphasis on purification and cleanliness in the Ahaadith, the early understanding of quarantine during a plague, or the detailed Islamic guidelines for consuming pure and nutritious food.

To comprehensively address the broad range of systemic health challenges affecting our world today, communities need public health professionals who can use critical thinking and systems-based skills for researching, developing, and implementing sustainable prevention-focused solutions.

Whether working to prevent deaths from the next potential global pandemic, improving lifestyles through healthy nutrition and physical activity, or mitigating the effects of natural disasters on their communities, public health professionals can take a variety of career paths. Their work ranges from scientific researchers to urban city planners across government, private, non-profit, or academic settings.

Public health professionals may choose to work within their local communities or at the provincial, national, or international level and can find roles as data analysts, policy researchers, hospital administrators, behavioral educators, program coordinators, environmental inspectors, and many more.

Public health interventions are an immensely intertwined part of our daily lives and have an enormous impact on keeping our communities safe and healthy. To address the new health challenges of our time and effectively improve the health of our global community, a collaborative approach across numerous disciplines, fields, and industries is required to apply an Islamic public health perspective to develop well-planned, sustainable solutions.

Importance of Agriculture in the World's Economy

griculture holds a pivotal position in the global economy. All other spheres of endeavours to man revolve around it. Food provision for the increasing world population of 7.5 billion today, projected to be 10 billion by 2050, is the goal of agriculture. In the same vein, a vast global web of farmers, traders, food manufacturers, retailers, and many others are

involved in getting this food from farm to fork, leading to improved income for all in the food production chain and the government. Based on the factors mentioned above, there are some emerging challenges. Although modernity in technology is addressing some of them, others still need to be considered.

According to the Food and Agri-

culture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), in 2021, the global value generated by agriculture, forestry, and fishing increased by 73% in real terms between 2000 and 2019, reaching \$3.5 trillion in 2019. Total production of primary crops, of which sugar cane, maize, wheat, and rice take half, increased by 53 percent between 2000 and 2019, hitting a record high of 9.4 billion tonnes in



2019. Livestock contributed 40% to total global agricultural production. Besides, agriculture also employed 874 million people in 2020, totaling 27 percent of the global workforce.

It is thus the expectation of the planet that agriculture in its global food system becomes sustainable to such an extent that safe and nutritious food will be made available per capita. However, food production is only one aspect of the food system. The agro-food sector also provides a livelihood for millions of people. Worldwide, most of those living in extreme poverty are in rural areas, where food production is often the most important economic activity. There are roughly 570

million farms worldwide today, and millions of other people work in food-related jobs.

Agriculture thus has challenges just as there are prospects in it. Some of the challenges result from other human activities that are essential for living. Some are even agricultural activities-imposed such as irrigation of crops and water use, greenhouse gas emission, fertilization of crops, grazing of animals, etc.

Succinctly put, the challenges of agriculture in the world today can be encapsulated as threefold;

✓ Providing alivelihood for farmers, and

☑ Protecting the environment.

To achieve the desired prospects and sustainability of agriculture worldwide, the challenges identified above need consideration. These would require some synergies among other proactive steps with expected positive outcomes. There would, however, be some forms of trade-off in the process.

We can take a clue from the lessons imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic hampering national capacities to collect timely, accurate, and high-quality data and statistics to inform timely responses and monitor trends in agricultural production, importation, exportation, marketing, delivery and consumption. One cannot agree less with José Rosero Moncayo, Director of FAO's Statistics Division. He empha-

sized that data collection and statistics are the cornerstones of solid policy design and development plans and agendas.

It is high time we produced well-trained personnel that could create the required blend of all in the line of agricultural production to delivery and consumption. This will enhance the growth of the economy and sustain its potential for the future.

Agricultural professional experts are needed and expected to get involved in making policies that address the interconnectedness amidst the threefold challenges mentioned earlier. It is common sense to do this. In making efforts to produce needed professionals in tackling the world's agricultural challenges, the International Open University (IOU) is ready to launch its Agricultural Economics degree program, which would hopefully help to explore the unlimited positive prospects

Agricultural Economics with an Islamic Insight











he utilization of agricultural techniques, evolving over centuries, has been pivotal in the growth and expansion of human civilization to this day. During the Islamic Golden Age in Andalusia, North Africa, and the Middle East, Muslims transformed agriculture into science and revolutionized it. It was during this time farmers learned new skills such as crop rotation and sakia water wheel for irrigation.

Every new era brings different populations of people and agricultural needs. Some rely heavily on the produce directly harvested, while others benefit from trading the harvest for a return. This ultimately plays a major role in the agricultural industry developing into a pivotal link between the agricultural sector and the rest of the economy.

To show an appreciation for the

mastery of these abilities, one must spend a great amount of time in the field and apply these skills in ways that will manage and develop society. In order to apply the sciences of agriculture directly to the socioeconomic impact it has on society, a student is required to explore the study of Agricultural Economics.

Agricultural Economics is a field within the agricultural industry that uses economic principles to optimize food production, especially in less developed countries while also improving rural livelihoods. In this field of study, attention is given to all aspects of problems related to agriculture from an economic perspective.

Following the mission of the International Open University (IOU), the Faculty of Liberal Arts and Sciences offers a one-year course that introduces students to the basics of Agricultural

Upon successful completion, students can further pursue their Diploma, and then their Bachelor's degree in Agricultural

Chancellor Inaugurates IOU E-Learning Center in The Gambia's Jarra Soma

In its quest to make authentic, quality education readily available, affordable, and accessible to the masses, the International Open University (IOU) launched an e-learning center at Jarra Soma to complement the government's efforts to decentralize tertiary education in The Gambia.

In a great breakthrough for the university, it inaugurated its first extension of the institution in The Gambia.

A high-powered delegation of IOU's staff and students headed by Chancellor Professor Bilal Philips, presided over the launch of the IOU Jarra Soma Center on October 20th, 2022.

The Chancellor remarked that IOU is the future of education in The Gambia, demarcating IOU's curriculum as being unique in providing education with a moral foundation, in complete contrast to purely secular education that has been stripped of all moral deliberations.

"This initiative will also equip teachers with quality education and train them professionally to educate the next generation", he said.

At the rate of 100 scholarships per year

he International Open University officials were invited to meet the President of The Gambia, where our headquarters resides, on Wednesday, October 19th, at 3 PM UTC.

Dr. Cherno Omar Barry, the IOU Vice Chancellor, suggested that we pray Salat-ud-Dhuhr there. So, we entered the presidential compound along with Chief Engineer of The Gambia Transport Service Company Khalifa Ceesay, IOU's Director of Administration Ismaila Bojang, and my son Abdullah Philips, who along with his wife and mother-in-law had just recently made Hijrah to The Gambia.

As we drove and walked through the presidential compound, many staffers greeted Dr. Barry warmly as he had worked there in the capacity of Permanent Secretary in 2018.

After praying Salat-ud-Dhuhr, we were ushered into the presidential meeting room and awaited his Excellency's arrival. After joining us, President Adama Barrow expressed his gratitude for the positive role that the IOU has played in The

Gambia's development.

I further emphasized the vision of the IOU in taking the university to the people rather than the people to the university, and elaborated on the many learning centers which the IOU has established in the past four years to make higher education more accessible to underprivileged youths in most of the English-speaking countries of Africa, beginning with The Gambia.

The Vice-Chancellor spoke on the many collaborative projects which IOU has embarked on with the Ministry of Higher Education and Lower Education, among which were the programs of intensive English for madrasa graduates and the provision of Bachelor of Education degrees for Teachers and College graduates, to upgrade the teaching qualifications of instructors in the country.

The President was very supportive of online education and expressed his view that it was the obligatory future direction of education, to fulfill the dream of higher education for all, to which he was committed.

Following the discussion, the

IOU delegation presented a symbolic cheque to the President for 1000 scholarships to be given to underprivileged Gambian youths, expressing IOU's desire to contribute substantially to the progress of the country.

I also presented copies of two of my published works, Usoolat-Tafseer and Ibn Taymiyyah's Essay on the Jinn, to his Excellency and thanked him for the Ministry of Education's recent issuance of accreditation to all of IOU's undergraduate courses as well as our Masters of Science in Islamic Psychology, after four long years of intensive efforts to bring our curricula in line with the high standards set by the National Accreditation and Quality Assurance Authority (NAOAA).

The IOU delegation returned to the headquarters jubilant and in very high spirits thanking Allah for His abundant mercies and IOU's continued successes.



One Million African Scholarships: 1MAS Highlights



ndoubtedly higher education in Africa is crucial to its development. As the world depicts herself as a global village, education is the key to its sustainability. Primarily, investment in education defines the penultimate paradigm shift - building sustainable growth across the continent and producing an educated and skilled workforce adaptive to the challenges of this era.

Keeping the need for education in mind, the International Open University (IOU) pioneered the 1 Million African Scholarship (1MAS) project, cruising at beacons of scholarship and educational financial aid to 1 million Africans to secure graduation.

A Thousand Beneficiaries in the Last Year

The fiscal year 2021-22 saw over a thousand new African students enrolled into various degree programs at IOU through the 1MAS project.

Leading Beneficiary Country

The 1MAS Project, initiated in September 2017 at The Gambia, has so far expanded to over 17 African countries awarding roughly 4000 scholarships till now. Nigeria, as the lead beneficiary, benefitted 950 continuing students, while 692 new beneficiaries were inducted in 2021/22.

Graduates from 1MAS

Incredibly, 60 students sponsored through the 1MAS project have graduated with a bachelor's degree in various programs including BA Islamic Studies, BSc Psychology, BA Arabic Language, BA Business Administration, BSc Islamic Economics, Banking and Finance and B. Education, among others. Indeed, it is an accolade worth mentioning which we could only achieve by the help and mercy of Allah.

IOU Established Four New 1MAS Centers in Africa Between 2021-2022

With our quest to reach a larger population in Africa and provide accessible and flexible university education, an additional four 1MAS centers were established across West, East and South African countries between 2021 and 2022. Specifically, these centers of excellence are located in Eswatini, Zambia, Ethiopia, and Nigeria. Establishing them led to an amazing recruitment of over 150 students.

Action Plan for the Next Year

The aim of the 1MAS project is to educate one million Africans within a decade. To commemorate this noble mission, we will be expanding and establishing more centres in Africa. By 2023, we intend to establish centers in Gweru, Zimbabwe; Soma, The Gambia; Zanzibar, Tanzania and Ilorin, Nigeria. Additionally, we will be producing a detailed documentary of the 1MAS.

IOU's Corporate Relationship Program: Bringing Students and Employers Together



In a recent Forbes magazine article 'Not Even Inflation Can Kill the Job Boom' highlighting the state of the economy, companies report higher inflation rates while the demand to fill vacant positions continues to rise. Industry experts observe that even though workers are being laid off, the job market is so red hot, that companies can't hire suitable applicants fast enough.

What's the reason behind this?

Increased energy costs of raw materials and supply chain barriers present additional burdens for companies, but the labor market is so competitive that the demand for workers entering and re-entering the workforce post-pandemic is at an all-time high. Companies are

hiring and holding on to valuable staff. The pandemic has forced many corporations to reinvent themselves, and the transformation, although hitting them where it hurts, has created opportunities that didn't exist before. This is good news for graduates and those with strong in-demand skill sets.

In Bangladesh, for example, symbolic of what's happening across many nations, the unemployment rate, which measures the number of people looking for a job, was as low as 4.3 % pre-pandemic. It drastically increased to 5.3% in 2020. However, in 2021 it decreased to 5.2%. This confirms that companies have started to look for, hire, and rehire qualified and skilled workers.

Lower unemployment rates should lead to lower inflation. This is good news for companies but this trend is not sustainable.

A Decade of Building a Global Community: The Student Committee Conference 2022

he Student Committee commemorated its 10th anniversary with a Student Committee (SC) Conference this year. The guest speaker, IOU's Chancellor and Student Committee founder Prof. Dr. Bilal Philips, addressed members, leaders, and chairpersons of the SC and gave them an opportunity to raise questions and find solutions.

Many key topics were discussed at the conference, including the creation of the SC, its aims, responsibilities, and future plans.

The SC was established to assist freshman students of the IOU by rendering comprehensive internet skills attuned to online studying. During the conference, Dr. Bilal reflected on the convenience of pre-acquired knowledge of computers and the internet. While some students are well acquainted with the functionality of the internet – they simply enroll and start studying right away, there are others for whom adjustment to distance learning is a process that requires time.



The idea of a student board was thereby conceptualized to serve the needs of students in a way similar to what representatives do, but on a much larger scale. What distinguishes the IOU Student Committee from others is that it is not bound by traditional university methods; for instance, a conventional university does not have representatives if they establish campuses in other countries. This makes the IOU Student Committees stand in a league of their own.

Setting up the Student Committee was also an attempt to give students a taste of university life, as well as a chance to partake in activities like offline socialization. This was an opportunity for students to participate in this interactive workshop, and learn how to collaborate with others, especially other Muslims. The SC, therefore, created space for the students to embrace the university spirit without the interference of the corrupting elements often found in western universities. Students would, however, still be exposed to other cultures and have the opportunity to work with international peers.

The same year, Dr. Bilal introduced the Student Community Service, which takes students out of their ivory towers and into the community to serve. He discovered the value of community service while working as an Imam in Toronto, where high school students were required to do volunteer work. He would confirm the hours spent by students who came to the masjid and helped out

The Student Community Service at the IOU provides an outlet for students to serve the community and pass on their knowledge.

The SC wishes to eventually expand its program globally. At the moment, SC has representatives from 43 countries. The individualistic distinctiveness rooted in various cultural backgrounds within the student committee is noteworthy.

The Student Committee at the IOU is an exemplar of this, Alhamdulillah!

receiving greater institutional visibility and an enhanced academic reputation.



He learned English from IOU's offline Intensive English Course and went on to pursue a BEd in English medium. He reflected, "When Corona hit in 2019, I was thankful. I said Alhamdulillah for choosing IOU. The entire world was confused, and all universities were shut down. The only university that was running with no difficulty in this country was IOU".

Deputy Administrative Director Sediki Ceesay is also an alumnus of the Masters in Islamic Studies program. A scholarship student, Ceesay was raised in a Sufi family, and IOU introduced him to life-changing knowledge and opportunities. He is notably among those who have relentlessly contributed to establishing IOU in The Gambia.

Held in early September, within arm's reach of the commencement of the Fall semester, the reunion depicted the strong bond between the alumni and their alma mater. of Study offered by IOU, but even experts or scholars in their particular field who want to enhance their education or extend it.

One such student was Shaykh Abdenasser Zouhri, a longtime Imam and U.S.-based student of knowledge, who chose the IOU for his extended education.

Born in Morocco during the war of independence of Algeria, Shaykh Zouhri came to the United States in 1975 on a scholarship to study engineering. He obtained his B.S. degree in Industrial Engineering from the University of Massachusetts.

In 1989, he moved to Durham, N.C. where he has been serving as a Triangle area (Durham, Raleigh, and

Chapel Hill) Imam since 1993. He became a founding member of the Carolina Islamic Council (CIC) and delivered numerous lectures in masjids throughout North and South Carolina in the U.S.

Well-liked and highly regarded as an Imam and speaker, one would think him satisfied to rest on his laurels, but Shaykh Zouhri is not one to just rest or be satisfied with his current status.

He decided to continue his Islamic Studies education by choosing IOU and obtaining both a Bridge to Masters in Islamic Studies - BMAIS (Postgraduate degree) in 2014 and MAIS in 2016.

Answering a set of questions about his experience at the IOU, Shaykh Zouhri said it was generally a very satisfying and beneficial experience. "The IOU team made learning easily accessible, absorbable, and adaptable," he said.

"Alhamdulillah, studying at IOU was extremely simple and easy," he continued. Though richly rewarding and a privilege to be an Imam and slave of Allah in this way, too often Imams are not highly paid, so attending a university or college or any Islamic Studies program could be out of financial reach for many.

Shaykh Zouhri noted that IOU's tuition – a fraction of what many other online programs offer -- was a blessing, while IOU still manages to dignity itself as an illustrious fountain of knowledge.

"It is affordable," commented Shaykh Zouhri, when asked about the cost of running a program at IOU in comparison to other universities.

He advises that all who want to study Islam should not be hesitant about starting and they should try to begin as soon as possible. "I also encourage anyone interested in learning more about Islam to attend the IOU," he said. "It is convenient; you can study at your own pace, and it is an excellent institution," he added

Having passed through the system, Shaykh Zouhri believes IOU fulfills the criteria for a graduate college, and its students only need to be diligent and meticulous to learn from and leverage the institution.

"Anyone who is struggling in their studies should think about the words of Imam Shafi'ee (may Allah have mercy on him)," he said. "Imam Shafi'ee stated that 'to acquire knowledge, you need six things: Intellect, Desire, Ambition, Be content, Good Teacher, and Time'."

As Shaykh Zouhri implied, a strong network of IOU alumni is rapidly growing across the world and helping others tap into the IOU's value system through sponsorship, recommendations, and most importantly by serving as living precedents of the illuminating touch of IOU, which is transforming people across borders.

Shaykh Zouhri is one such alumnus and Alhumdulillah, now there are countless others.




Beauty Advisor @Wideratna with 12,000 followers posted a video advocating the IOU as "The most attractive & relevant system of education for the modern era."

he International Open University (IOU) has continued to strengthen its collaborative strides through strategic alliances with several leading academic organizations across the globe. A Reflection on IOU's Quality Assurance Strategy

he International Open University is one of the most comprehensive providers of online learning, based on its learning methodologies and assessment tools used to gauge the progress of students, which in turn enhances their learning capabilities and successful career outcomes.

According to many educational experts and scholars, education is a fundamental human right revolving around availability, accessibility, acceptability, and adaptability. In its quest to advance this right, IOU provides accessible, attractive, and affordable education to anyone desirous of a higher education no matter where they reside and at a time convenient to learners. Several Certificate, Diploma, Bachelor, and Master's degree programs are offered at IOU to prospective candidates to develop their career prospects. IOU's online education platform not only provides access to education but also promotes student-centered learning.

IOU's Learning Methodology

In its purest application to provide access to education and promote student-centered learning, the International Open University delivers education via online platforms using both synchronous and asynchronous methodologies, as we will explain. Student Assessments

The strength of both these student-centered learning methods is strategically embedded in the learning process at the IOU. Learners cannot proceed to another module, without completing a module test provided at the end of each module. If a student's performance is below the minimum standard or threshold, access to the next module is denied and the student is compelled to properly revise his or her learning techniques



in the module. In order to proceed to the next module they must complete the current module's test. This process progresses until all the modules of the course are successfully completed within a specified duration of the curriculum requirement.

Providing education with various methodologies will not be completed without assessment of student learning. In this regard, IOU monitors student learning and progress throughout the program of study.

In this pursuit, the module test makes a formative assessment of the student's learning progress and provides a general reflection of the student's understanding of the entire module. During the semester, learners are given assignments that must be submitted on time. Where learners fail in this demand, late submission constitutes a serious reprimand. The imposition of this reprimand is not considered a punitive measure but encourages and motivates learners to respect deadlines, thereby maximizing the requisite benefits accrued to gain good grades. After completing a number of modules, mid-term assessments are conducted halfway into the program.

The mid-term tests and the summative end-of-semester student learning assessments are conducted in authorized examination centers in the students' countries. The most desired quality assurance benefit of these assessments is the students' potential to maintain a high degree of transparency and accountability, thereby curbing the incidence of student examination misconduct, otherwise known as cheating.

In this assessment methodology, a computer-generated unique set of questions are displayed for a student who logs into the system ready for examination. In other words, students sitting next to each other doing the same course are presented with a completely different set of questions. As soon as the questions are displayed, an automatic timer begins to count down and when the time allocated to complete the exams elapses, the student's paper is automatically submitted.

Similarly, in an event that a student resets the computer, due to technical faults or other issues, during the test, a different set of questions appear. This assures that the credibility and integrity of the IOU's Online education system is kept intact. Coupled with the strength of the computer programming to effectively control the tendency of examination misconduct, the Quality Assurance Authorities giving Institutional Accreditation require all examination centers to be fitted with Closed Circuit Television Monitoring systems to support and provide more evidence of a claim of ex-

amination misconduct. The stringent conditions of the learning and assessment process at the IOU help to make it a highly regarded higher education institution with an indelible credibility and integrity profile around the world.

Agriculture: An Ancient Skill, Still Needed Today!

griculture is evergreen because it has sustained the past, embraces the present, and guarantees the future. Agriculture is broadly defined as the science or art involving soil cultivation, crop production, and livestock raising, which also involves the preparation and marketing of the resulting products. This marvelous art has been providing the food and associated products required for sustaining the fast-growing human population since time immemorial.

Nonetheless, agriculture in recent times is facing multifaceted challenges such as climate change, paucity of funds, a fast-growing population, ever-changing consumer preferences, and rapid technological growth. The most alarming of these challenges is the unwillingness of the youth to participate in agriculture. Fortunately, some of these challenges can be converted into opportunities if properly harnessed.

Rural smallholder farms produce around a third of the world's food production¹ and the majority of experienced farmers are part of an aging population. The average age of farming household heads in Nigeria, Mexico, and Peru is around 57 years². Our global food security becomes more vulnerable as these aging farmers retire. The new generation has grown up seeing these old farmers struggle and perceive agriculture as an art that involves drudgery and a non-lucrative venture. If all young aspiring minds move on to

non-agricultural activities, then who would be left to produce the food basket we consume in the nearest future? These were some of the issues I was ruminating over in my mind at the prime of my graduation as a young agricultural economist.

I had to redefine what agriculture means to me. Agriculture has transcended the traditional cultivation of crops and livestock; it also involves utilizing innovation, technology, and value-addition to enhance production and profitability. In my quest for agricultural redefinition, I incorporated the catfish farming experience I had acquired while assisting my father during my study of agricultural economics at the university.

I started a small-scale aquaculture business (catfish farming) in my father's backyard while using an innovative pond. This pond was made with wood, screws, and a tarpaulin cover. I leveraged information technology to acquire knowledge of new practices across borders. At the time of harvesting, social media platforms such as Facebook and WhatsApp were used in sending out marketing messages to my potential customers. This eliminated the stress of having to depend on a broker while maximizing the farm's price margin.

Agriculture value-addition is also a game changer in the aquaculture business. The stock of catfish can be categorized, with some being oven-dried and others kept as bloodstock, for a part of the market involved in catfish spawning. This value addition involves less stress as compared to the production of fresh table-size catfish. Value addition is one of the arts of modern agriculture that is worth exploring. For example, Africa produces about 75% of global cocoa production but only receives around 5% of the total annual market value³. More income and job opportunities could arise when Africa taps its value-addition potential.

My shared aquaculture business experience is just an example of a branch of agriculture done on a small scale. Presumably, the magnitude of positive impact and spill-over effect that would have been generated if my aquaculture business was to be done on a large scale, using sophisticated machines and digital

agriculture, would be far-reaching in contribution to the job and food security of the rapidly growing population. It could also enhance the continuity of our existence. This small-scale farming can be replicated and advocated for in different branches of agricultural production. Recent innovations in agriculture have

birthed new concepts such as indoor vertical farming (hydroponic and aeroponics), aquaponics, and smart apiary (bee) technologies. Some of these concepts require fewer start-up funds and space to establish. These are areas youth can explore for further development and business, in my view as an agriculturist.

Agriculture is a noble art that sustains the earth, and it is religiously encouraged based on detailed and aggregative textual evidence. In one narration, a young companion of the Prophet (**), Anas ibn Malik (may Allah be pleased with him), narrated from the Prophet (**) saying, "Even if the Resurrection were established upon one of you while he has in his hand a sapling, let him plant it."

A Commentary On The 36th Chapter Of The Qur'an




