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

bn Taymiyyah (حمه الله) once said, "The heart becomes sick, as does the body, and its remedy lies in repentance and seeking knowledge." These words encapsulate the transformative power of knowledge in Islam, likening it to a luminous thread that weaves through the hearts and minds of believers, infusing their lives with spiritual depth and emotional richness.

This knowledge holds significant emotional and spiritual significance, shaping the lives of believers and nurturing a deeper connection with Allah. It spans a wide spectrum - from understanding Quran and Hadith to delving into jurisprudence, spirituality, and theology, meaningfully affecting the heart and soul of believers. Individuals seeking Islamic knowledge venture into a journey of spiritual growth and enlightenment, fostering a deeper connection between the Creator and His creation.

What is *Ilm* (knowledge) in Islam?

Ilm is highly revered and encompasses religious and secular information. It is multidimensional, including the knowledge of Allah and His attributes, the Quran and Hadith, Islamic law and jurisprudence, as well as intellectual and scientific learning.

Allah says, "...Allah will elevate those of you who are faithful, and raise those gifted with knowledge in rank. And Allah is All-Aware of what you do" (Surah Al-Mujaadilah (58):11). This verse underscores the divine elevation of those who seek and possess knowledge. Prophet Muhammad (*) emphasized this, stating, "Seeking knowledge is an obligation upon every Muslim." (Ibn Majah)

Islam encourages both men and women to seek not only religious knowledge but also modern knowledge. Consequently, Muslims have made notable contributions not only to Islamic jurisprudence but also to the development of various modern-day sciences.

Spiritual, Emotional, and Psychological Impacts of Islamic Knowledge

Islamic knowledge enhances the spiritual connection with Allah, nurtured through worship, supplication, tafakkur (reflection), and taqwa (devotion). This leads to the purification and softening of hearts and minds. Ibn Taymiyyah (معله) emphasized the inseparable connection between knowledge and the heart, stating, "The heart is the sanctuary of God; therefore, do not let anything enter it except God, the Exalted." He believed beneficial knowledge nurtures faith, purifies the heart, and guides individuals toward righteousness.

The Noble Quran frequently highlights the importance of the heart in spiritual life. In Surah Ash-Shu'ara, Allah says, "The Day when there will not benefit [anyone] wealth or children, but only one who comes to Allah with a sound heart" (Surah Ash-Shura (26):88-89). This verse emphasizes that a pure heart is crucial for salvation and closeness to Allah.


Prophet Muhammad (**) also spoke about the significance of the heart. He said, "Beware! There is a piece of flesh in the body; if it becomes good (reformed), the whole body becomes good; but if it gets spoiled, the whole body gets spoilt. And that piece of flesh is the heart" (Sahih Bukhari). This hadith underscores the central role of the heart in determining the overall moral and spiritual health of an individual.

Shaykh Ibn Baz (حمه المحمد) reiterated this, saying, "The heart is the foundation. If the heart is sound and good, everything else will be sound and good. If the heart is corrupt, everything else will be corrupt." He encouraged Muslims to engage in regular acts of worship and self-reflection to keep the heart pure and connected to Allah. He also spoke about how knowledge softens the heart, making it more receptive to faith and compassion.

Application of Knowledge in Daily Life

Islamic principles provide a comprehensive framework that enables Muslims to live balanced and fulfilled lives. It facilitates women in their roles as daughters, wives, and mothers, inspiring them to acquire both religious and worldly knowledge, thus empowering them to contribute positively to society. Islamic teachings on modesty guide working women in navigating social settings with confidence and dignity. Similarly, Islamic knowledge fosters a sense of social responsibility and communal engagement. Women are encouraged to take dynamic roles in their communities, contributing to social welfare and development.

Moreover, the teachings of Islam guide every aspect of a believer's life, ensuring that the heart remains pure and connected to Allah. The Prophet (**) said, "Verily, Allah does not look at your appearance or wealth, but rather He looks at your hearts and actions" (Sahih Muslim), emphasizing that Allah values the sincerity and purity of one's heart above all else.

Islamic knowledge purifies, enlightens, and softens the heart by fostering a close relationship with Allah. It offers emotional healing, promotes introspection, and establishes a sense of accountability. Typing with only one or two fingers was slow and painstaking, and accessing her computer required a strict schedule. However, IOU's flexible online platform provided a lifeline, allowing her to pursue education from home.

Ayan's journey was filled with moments of fear and heartache, but also inspiration and faith. She believed that if one truly seeks knowledge for the sake of Allah, He will facilitate his/her path.

1MAS Center in The Gambia Showcases Enhanced Facility

he International Open University (IOU) 1MAS Center has a longstanding history of providing internet services to IOU students, particularly to those students facing financial challenges in acquiring laptops. The 1 Million African Scholarship (1MAS) Project has been vital in covering tuition fees and supplying computers for students' online access.

In the past, the 1MAS Center has been a hub for students needing to complete their lessons, assignments, midterms, and finals online. Initially, the internet services at the 1MAS Center faced challenges due to its outdated computer systems and subpar network connectivity. However, these issues have been resolved with the center's recent transformation into a state-of-the-art computer lab.

In August 2023, the center underwent significant improvements, receiving a modern facelift that included replacing old desktop computers with high-quality portable Dell laptops, thus boasting fast internet connections. Celebrating a Decade of Excellence


International Open University's 10th Convocation

Innovative Law Program Takes Root at IOU

he National Accreditation and Quality Assurance Authority (NAQAA) is the accreditation body in The Gambia. After the shutdown of Legacy University in The Gambia, NAQAA requested that IOU accept the largest group of Legacy's students and take over the administration of their Law program in order to help students complete their education. IOU provisionally adopted Legacy University's curriculum and found a facility for its law studies, which included a courtroom.

All human activities – social, economic, and political – take place within a legal framework. IOU's upcoming law program is designed to ensure that graduates will have comprehensive knowledge of legal systems and a clear understanding of their importance in governing society, especially in the context of The Gambia.

It then behooves the law student to have broad knowledge and exposure to other disciplines while acquiring legal education. The program aims to introduce students to the principles of the judicial process and its legal development while equipping them with the primary tools of legal analysis and a clear understanding of its methods.

The curriculum ensures that law is taught as it exists at any given moment and that every student will be comparative in their approach to legal studies. They should bear in mind the many systems of law that are currently in operation, such as: Statutory Law, Common Law, Customary Law, Ecclesiastical Law, and Islamic Law.

Being a trending professional field of study added to the motivation that gave rise to the proposal for the formation of the law department.

Specializations of IOU's Law Program

IOU plans to offer courses and programs leading to the degree of Bachelor of Law (LLB) Honors, Diploma in Law, and a Certificate course in Legal Studies as it grows from what it is today, and to offer four specializations:

1. International Law

Since IOU is an international university, studying international law is essential and incumbent. Domestic law is specific to a country, but international law will give students worldwide legal knowledge, including international treaties and conventions.

2. International Human Rights

Human rights are discussed worldwide, but contemporary human rights bodies use their logic and rationale to decide what is moral. At IOU, human rights would be taught from an Islamic perspective using authentic Islamic sources, along with equipping students with the practical application of human rights within their countries.

3. Shariah Law

Laymen, lawmakers, and law students alike are ignorant of the Shariah law; therefore, most people assume it is brutal and extreme. Studying this subject is essential and beneficial for both Muslims and non-Muslims. If humans can make laws to control society, then why can't Allah, the Creator of the universe? This topic would cover the foundations of the Shariah, man-made laws, and the hudood, including the wisdom behind hudood and the legal processes. The hudood are more than just punishments, but deterrents put in place to keep society in order and to prevent chaos. When the Shariah laws are correctly implemented, it is rare to find the hudood carried out in Islamic societies, especially when you have a law-abiding community.

4. Peace and Conflict Resolution

Many conflicts are plaguing the world, such as wars, family problems, and the suffering of the weak and innocent due to oppression, injustice, trauma, refugee crises, and other vices. Studying how to prevent these conflicts and concerns through peaceful resolutions would be immensely valuable for societies worldwide.

Case Study of SABIC - A Saudi Company Producing Petrochemicals for Global Market Needs



Abstract

SABIC is a large company with several affiliates. The company recorded a net profit of US\$5.7 billion in 2018. Founded in 1976 by a royal decree, SABIC (Saudi Basic Industries Corporation) specializes in the by-products of oil extraction to create value-added commodities such as chemicals, polymers, and fertilizers, including high-performance plastics, agro-nutrients, and metals. The company's export markets include the Americas, Europe, the Middle East, and Asia

Pacific. Its business indirectly supports customers in construction, medical devices, packaging, agro-nutrients, electrical and electronics, transportation, and serves as a source of clean energy for international clients.

Besides a net profit of US\$5.7 billion, SABIC's sales revenues for 2018 totaled US\$45 billion, and its total assets were US\$85 billion in the same year. Its production capacity reached 75.3 million metric tons in 2018. SABIC provides livelihood for over 33,000 employees worldwide and operates in approximately 50 countries. The Saudi Arabian government owns 70 percent of SABIC shares, with the remaining 30 percent publicly traded on the Saudi stock exchange.

SABIC's affiliated companies include SABIC Sukuk, Saudi Iron & Steel Company (Hadeed), and National Industrial Gases Co. (Gas), among others. Even companies such as Saudi Methanol Co. (Ar-Razi) and Korea Nexlene Company (KNC) are its associates. Islam, the official religion of the Kingdom, dictates business practices as mandated by Saudi laws, including fasting during Ramadan, performing Hajj, and pausing work for prayers five times daily. Facilities for ablution (Wudu/daily wash) are mandatory even in SABIC's headquarters in Riyadh/Jubail. SABIC's management adopts a guardian leadership style, promoting a just and fair environment and ensuring a return on investment for shareholders.

Study of the Efficacy of Islamic Practices among the Youth in Chennai, India



Abstract

This study investigates the effectiveness of Islamic practices among the youth in Chennai, India, exploring various factors that influence their understanding and adherence to Islam. It encompasses socio-economic strata, generational

differences, and familial dynamics, focusing on youth aged 18-26 years and delving into obstacles faced across these subsets. Notably, the study identifies a disparity between theoretical knowledge and Islamic practices, particularly

evident in the upper class. Despite acquiring substantial theoretical knowledge, this subset falls short in translating it into practical actions. The research emphasizes solutions for empowering youth to overcome these obstacles, providing guidance on adhering to Islamic teachings.

Through extensive analysis, the study reveals a consistent pattern where distractions such as social media and television consistently rank as the primary obstacle across all surveyed socio-economic strata. It critically examines the necessity of social media while offering recommendations to mitigate its adverse effects. Additionally, peer pressure to enjoy life emerges as the second most prevalent obstacle, prompting

discussions on societal norms and cultural influences on youth, along with recommendations on resisting undue influence.

The disparity between knowledge and practice for upper class participants is 15.5%, upper middle class is 3.5%, middle class is 4.7%, and lower middle class is 1.5%. The challenges encountered by different generational strata exhibit significant consistency, with distractions such as television and social media emerging as the primary factor, closely followed by peer pressure to enjoy life. Among the datasets, individuals with only their mothers practicing Islam exhibit the lowest percentage of adherence (40%), underscoring the crucial role of the father in the family.



The International Open University (IOU) and the Ministry of Education in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) have made notable progress in collaborative educational initiatives. A recent meeting, chaired by MP Eddie M Alih, Chairperson for Education in BARMM, focused on scholarship funding and the formalization of partnerships.

Scholarship Initiatives

Enhancing Scholarship Opportunities

In a significant move to support education in the region, discussions during the second meeting revolved around budget allocations for scholarship grants aimed at senior high graduates and Imams involved in the Islamic Studies and Arabic Language (ISAL) program. The proposed plan involves full funding for senior high tuition fees and a combined effort with IOU to cover 40% of tuition fees for Imams, complementing IOU's 60% discount.

Formalizing Educational Partnerships

The meeting also laid the groundwork for a structured partnership between BARMM's

Ministry of Education and IOU through the Kuliyyah Institute. This initiative aims to develop dual degree programs, enhance the educational offerings, and provide broader academic opportunities to students in the region. The next steps include formalizing the proposal, setting up meetings to finalize the details of the partnership, and drafting a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU).

Moving Forward with Strategic Collaboration

MP Eddie M Alih has committed to integrating the educational proposals into the ongoing budget discussions for BARMM's Ministry of Education and plans to advocate directly with the ministry's head to ensure its timely implementation.

IOU Shines at AAOU

Educational Technology Webinar

The Asian Association of Online Universities (AAOU) has been at the forefront of integrating innovative tools and platforms to enhance educational accessibility and quality. In its latest initiative, the AAOU conducted the second episode of its "AAOU Lecture Series 2024", which focused on research publications in open and distance education. The series is designed to foster innovation, creativity, and knowledge-sharing among education enthusiasts.

IOU's Key Representation

The International Open University (IOU) played a significant role in this event, ably represented by Professor Dr. Raufu Oyedapo, the Dean of Liberal Arts and Sciences. As a keynote speaker, Dr. Oyedapo addressed the theme "A Roadmap to Successful Publication", with a specific focus on "Choosing a Research Topic" during the webinar on March 20th, 2024.

Insights from the Lecture

Dr. Raufu Oyedapo's presentation provided a comprehensive overview of selecting and developing a research topic. He emphasized the importance of a well-chosen topic to:

- Inform readers about the subject matter and central theme of the research
- Enable quick identification of how well the study aligns with the interests of potential readers
- Enhance discoverability through relevant keywords
- Spark curiosity and encourage further reading

Professor Oyedapo skillfully outlined common pitfalls in topic selection, such as choosing overly broad topics, using complex language, and selecting topics that do not align with the research objectives. He provided ten steps for

developing a strong research topic, illustrated with examples across various fields, including environmental studies, computer science, and business administration.

Participant Engagement and Resources

The webinar was well-received, with over 150 students, lecturers, and researchers in attendance. Participants benefited from interactive discussions and were provided with e-certificates of attendance. 
